

The Weather Will Soon Warm Up

As winter winds down, it's important to remember that your pets need to stay up to date on their vaccines and on their monthly heartworm/flea/tick preventative medications to avoid parasitic infections. As the snow melts, please monitor your pets for any signs of infection. These can include fever, lethargy, loss of appetite, vomiting, diarrhea, and respiratory problems. If your pet has any of these symptoms, please give us a call!

Leptospirosis

We recommend our canine patients be vaccinated for Leptospirosis yearly - please give us a call to schedule your dog's vaccine if your records show they are due for it, especially as the weather warms up. The bacteria that causes this infection is spread by wildlife urine, and can be found in standing or slow moving water. Please refrain from allowing your dog to drink from unfamiliar water sources, and if your pet likes to go swimming in lakes/ponds/streams in the warm weather, please be sure their vaccines are up to date. All dogs, regardless of breed and age are at risk for this disease if exposed and not vaccinated. This illness is also zoonotic, which means it can be spread to humans if your dog has an active infection. It can be spread through any cuts on your skin and through mucous membranes.

March Is ...

National Pet Poison Prevention Awareness Month. There are many substances that are toxic to dogs and cats that are not toxic to humans. Most people know about chocolate being toxic to pets, but did you know that grapes, onions, garlic, macadamia nuts, raisins, xylitol (a common sweetener sometimes found in peanut butter), and raw yeast dough are all also toxic to pets? If your pet gets into any of these foods, please be sure to give us a call, or call Animal Poison Control at 888-426-4435.


